This Common Ground Bingo activity will show students to appreciate the things they share rather than focusing on the things that divide them.

PREPARATION

- What do you need?
 - Instruction sheet
 - Bingo card for each student (it's okay if some students have the same card)
 - Follow up reflection sheet (optional)
 - Pen/pencil
 - Timer (optional)
- B There are 3 different Bingo cards. Print some of each so not all students have the exact same card.

ACTIVITY

- Open class with a brief discussion of the phrase "common ground." What do those words mean? What do they make you think of? What do you picture when you hear "common ground?" (10 minutes)
- Explain that common ground means finding something you share with the people you meet, even when you come from different places in life.
- Tell students that you are going to read a list of qualities or experiences. They should not respond to this list while you're reading it. (5 minutes) (See next page for the full list)

- Tell them to think about which of those things are true about them. They will be looking to find someone they have something in common with—and they might be surprised to learn how much they have in common with some of their classmates.
- Pass one bingo card out to each student.
- 6 Give instructions:
 - Quickly find a classmate to pair up with.
 - Once paired up, see if you can find something you have in common on your Bingo board.
 - If you have something in common, write your initials on each other's Bingo board (in the square you have in common). Each square can only be initialed by one student.
 - If you have something in common that isn't listed, you can use the free space in the middle to write it down.
 - Ask a follow up question about what you have in common. For example: If you both have pets, what kind of pets?
 - After 30 seconds, a timer will go off and you'll scramble to find another partner (you can also be set up in two circles so you rotate from person to person instead of scrambling)
 - The first student to get 5 in a row shouts "Bingo" and will come up to the front of the class. You win if you remember the answers to your follow up questions for each square.

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
